Tuesday night is the traditional Powderpuff



Poinsettia and Cactus Sale


It's that time again! The order form for the Annual Staff Council Poinsettia & Christmas Cactus Sale will be released to the UT Dallas faculty and staff shortly.

A Salute to UT Dallas Faculty Authors and Editors

Each October for the past six years, the University's top producing authors and editors gather as guests of the Executive Vice President and Provost and the Director of Libraries to celebrate their published works from the recent academic year.

On October 13, 2011 honored faculty were feted to a reception and a

gallery of individually framed posters noting their books in the McDermott Suite on the fourth floor of Eugene McDermott Library. The 28 photographs were taken in locations across the campus.

Provost Hobson Wildenthal greeted the guests and Director of

Libraries Ellen Safley outlined the production of published works by each school in the university. These 16 authors and 9 editors had some very productive years.

Nils Roemer, a professor of historical studies in the School of Arts and Humanities, had the busiest year by writing German City, Jewish Memory: The Story of Worms. He coedited two other volumes – Crossing the Atlantic: Travel and Writing in Modern Times and Jewish Longings and Belongings in Modern European Consumer Culture.

Adrienne McLean, Professor of Film Studies, was the editor of *Glamour in*

several years in succession. This year Moller co-edited *The Book of Tinnitus* and Root wrote *The Living Chess Game: Fine Arts Activities for Kids 9-14*.

"The diversity of our faculty is shown in the wide range of subjects for which they publish each year," said Safley who organized the reception in

cooperation with Provost Wildenthal.

"We enjoy recognizing their significant commitment to scholarship. We are proud to add these publications to our collection."

Included in the festivities were faculty members who were promoted from assistant

professor without tenure to associate professor with tenure – a milestone in a professor's career. The newlytenured professors are invited to select a book that has been meaningful to them, either professionally or personally, to be added to the library's collection.
